

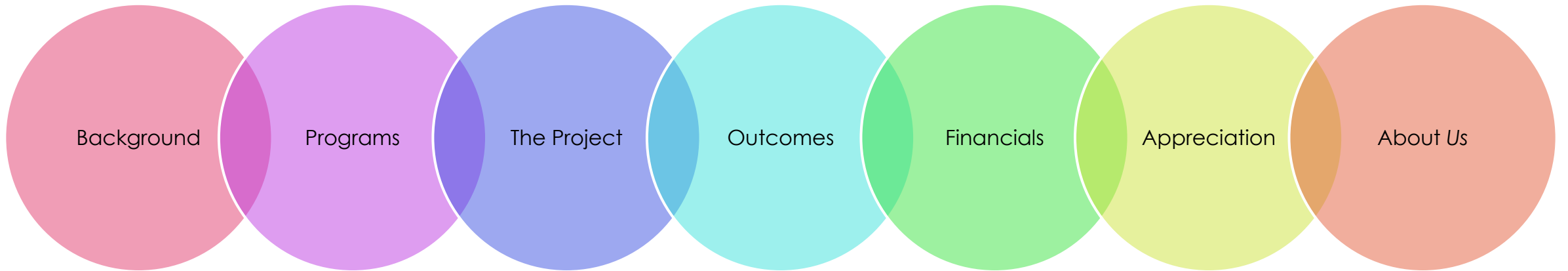

Background:

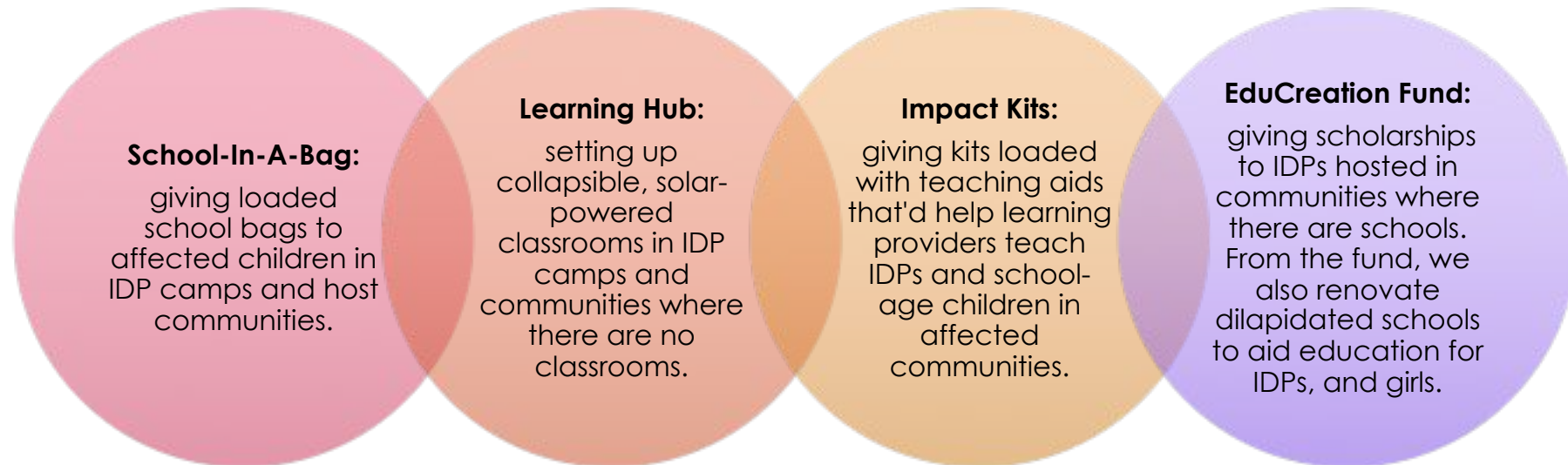
The Boko Haram insurgency ravaging the North Eastern part of Nigeria has caused untold havoc, including displacement of over two million persons, abductions, conscription and radicalization, killings, and immeasurable destructions. One of the critically affected aspects of life, as a result of the insurgency, is the attack on education, as evident in destroyed and abandoned schools, maiming of Educationists, and kidnapping of school children, among others. As such, education became severely endangered.

However, with the ongoing progressive and commendable efforts of the Nigerian Military, there has been return of some displaced persons to their towns, with some picking up their livelihood, while some schools are being reopened, leading to children returning to school, and education being gradually restored. It is noteworthy that some of the IDP Camps are able to have some form of learning, thereby bridging the educational gap that has been created as a result of the insurgency.

Chibok, with a population of about 90,927 - 40% (36,302) of whom are of school age and enrolled in one of the 19 public and private schools, while recording continuous increase in enrolment rate, is still in dire need of educational intervention, just like other affected communities. This much-needed intervention will not only to encourage the brave children who have returned to school despite the volatile security terrain, but also – and most importantly – would serve as an avenue to a deliberately fashioned and anticipated future where these ones can be the catalyst of the developmental advancement the region earnestly need.

Programs:

In view of the education gaps, *The Light Foundation* commenced two programmatic interventions – **Adopt-A-Camp** and **Girl Child Africa** – aimed at providing educational supports to IDPs, and girls in critically affected communities, respectively. To achieve the objectives of both programs, the following Projects were designed:



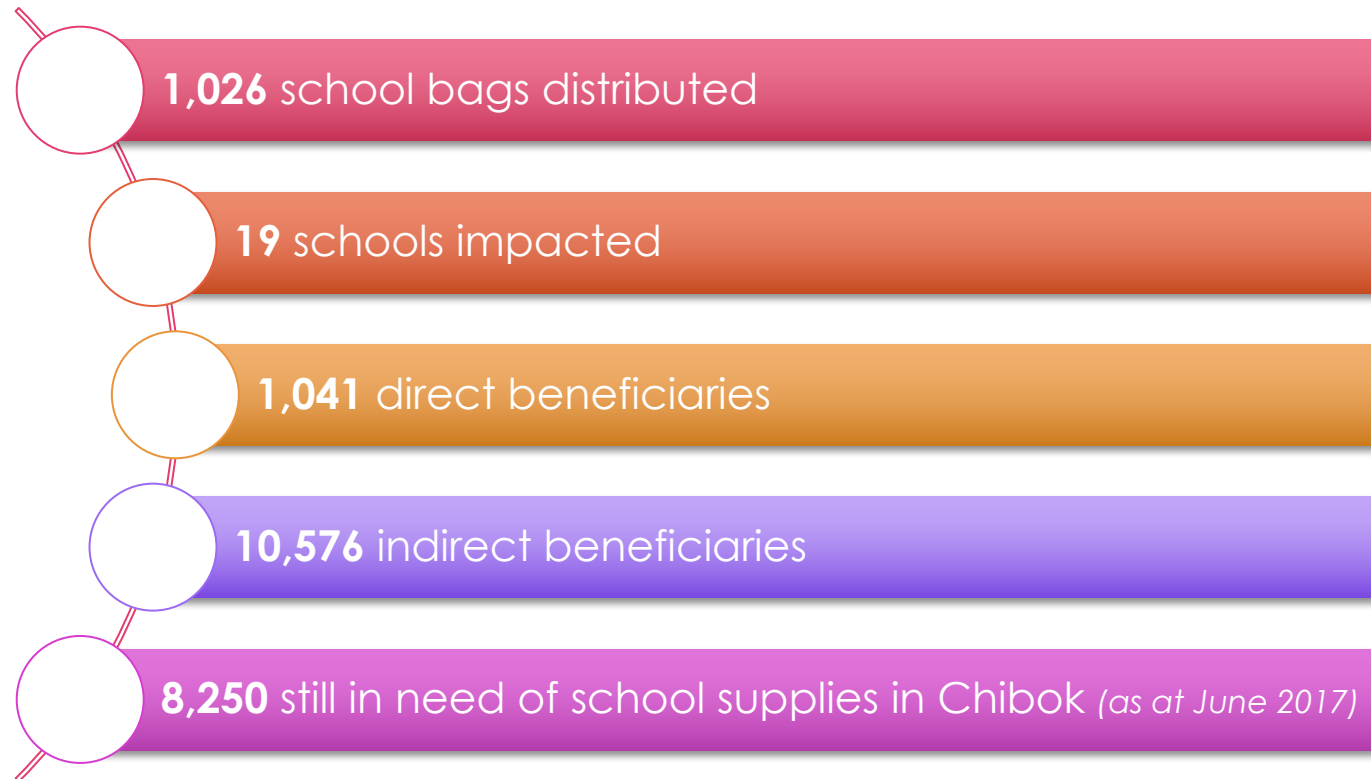
The Project:

Having implemented projects in Chibok in 2015, where food and non-food items were donated to some parents of the abducted Chibok schoolgirls; and in 2016, where 500 loaded school bags and sandals were distributed to 500 pupils from five schools, there was need to return to provide more support.

Thus, based on the obvious educational needs in Chibok Local Government Area, as a whole; coupled with the large number of pupils who have returned to school upon reopening of some schools; it was necessary to support the pupils with writing materials, school uniforms and sandals; while providing teachers and learning providers with relevant instructional materials and teaching aids, needed to aid impartation of knowledge. Hence, the *Missions to Chibok*, has been to implement our **School-In-A-Bag** and **Impact Kits** projects.

Chibok's Education Secretary's Speech

SPEECH BY THE CHIBOK LOCAL GOVERNMENT EDUCATION SECRETARY ALHAJI MALA ALH. KYARI ON THE OCCASION OF DISTRIBUTION OF LEARNING MATERIALS TO 1000 PRIMARY SCHOOL PUPILS & STUDENTS BY THE COORDINATOR ADOP-A-CAMP, MISS BUKKY SHONIBARE ON MONDAY 22nd MAY, 2017

I am indeed very happy to welcome you all on this great and important occasion of the launching of the Distribution of Learning Materials to 1000 Primary School Pupils/Students and Instructional Materials such as Text books, Chalks, Registers, Admission Registers etc for 10 Primary Schools and 3 JDSS in Chibok Local Government Area by Adop-a-camp.

2. This organization is the first to come to Chibok last year in October 2016 and distributed learning materials to 500 Pupils/Students and is here again for the second time to assist in our educational development.
3. It is indeed a great assistance to improve educational system in Chibok Local Government especially where such school buildings were destroyed or damaged by the dreaded Boko Haram.

4. Therefore, we highly appreciate the effort of the Adop-a-camp for coming to our aid by presenting learning materials to 1,500 Pupils/Students and instructional materials to 10 primary school and 3 Junior Day Secondary Schools in Chibok Local Government Area.

5. I must commend the effort of His Excellency, the Executive Governor of Borno State Hon. Kashim Shettima for the recent award of contracts for the construction of 17 Blocks of 34 classrooms, offices, stores and toilets and 2 blocks of 16 VIP Toilets at Mbalala Primary School and renovation of the L.G.E.A Secretariat in Chibok town as well as 8 Primary Schools namely Garu East, Mbowwa, Islamiya, Shiki, Danga, Mbalala West, Mbalala Primary School and Ngadarma and perimeter wall fencing at Garu East and Mbalala Primary School.

6. As we are now enjoying relative peace, 10 Primary Schools and 3 JDSS were re-opened with pupils/Student enrolment of about 7,892 and 1,672 respectively. This is out of the total 58 Primary Schools 13 JDSS with Pupils/Students enrolment of above 26,910 and 7,610 respectively.

7. At this juncture, may I seize this opportunity to appeal to other NGOS and well to do individuals to come to our aid and build or renovate these classes burnt by the insurgents so that our children can make use of these facilities to improve the standard of education as well as to open more schools to increase our School enrolment in our Local Government.

8. Finally I must commend the gallant effort of the Nigeria Army in Chibok as well as other security operatives for their effort in providing adequate security to our Pupils/Students and teachers in the schools which made it a conducive atmosphere for teaching/learning in all the schools now operating in Chibok.

9. With these few remarks, I sincerely thank you all for honoring our invitation on this great occasion and may Allah bless you all. Amin

Note: The initial plan was to reach 13 schools – 10 Primary, and three Junior Secondary Schools; however, on getting to Chibok, we adjusted and distributed among all 19 schools – 14 public schools comprising of 10 primary schools (with nursery sections), three junior secondary schools, and one senior secondary school; as well as five private schools (nursery and primary). All 19 schools were also given teaching aids and instructional materials.

Notes:

1. Schools where their pupils did not benefit from the school bags were either one of the five that benefitted during the #Mission2Chibok II, where we distributed 500 school bags in five schools. They could also be those who have received school bags from a similar initiative by the *Victims Support Fund (VSF)*.
2. The school bags and other educational items distributed in *Unique Model School* and *Alheri Model School* were part of school supplies donated by the 'Interact Club' of *John Cooper School, The Woodlands, Texas*. Other materials from the supplies were spread across the public nursery schools.

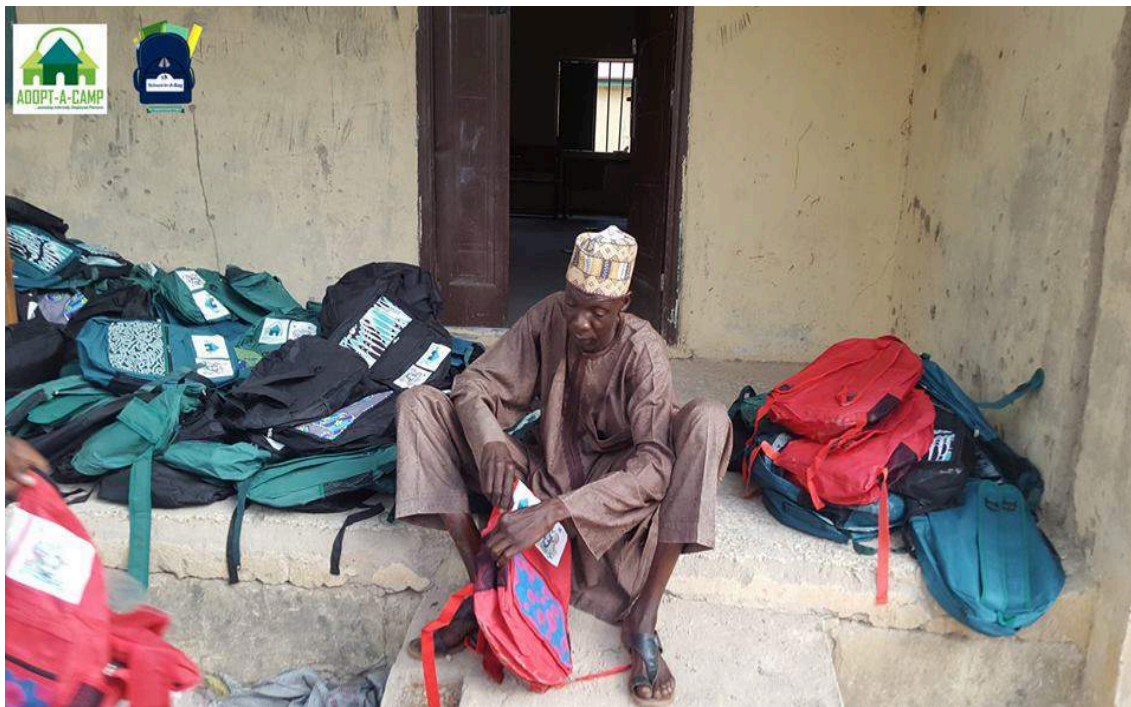

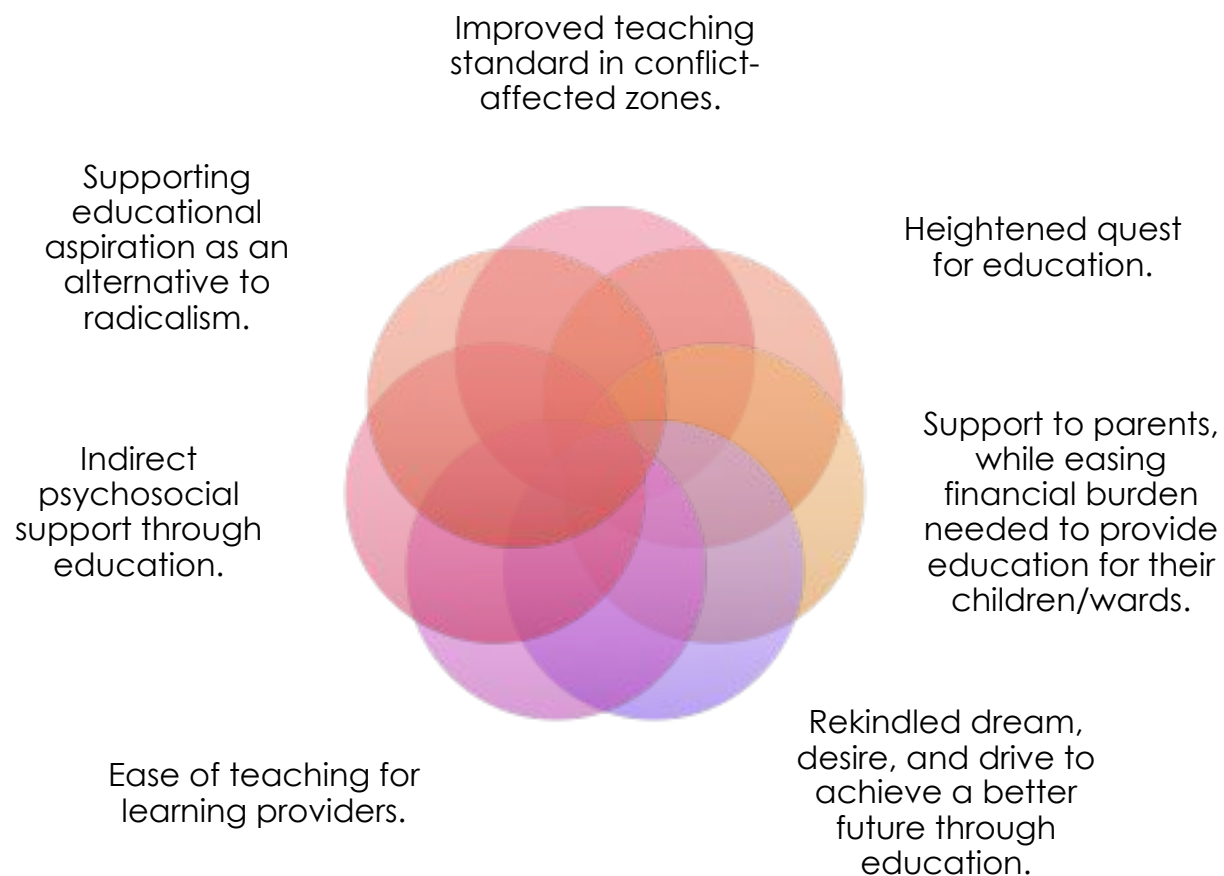

Note:

- \$130 was donated as part of the income from individuals. This is represented in Naira at the rate of N350 = \$1.
- To ensure a high level of efficiency, this project was achieved with 92% and 8% programming and non-programming costs, respectively. Thus, for every N1 we received, we used 92 kobo for the core project and 8 kobo for administrative and logistics cost. However, given our growing visibility and expanding operations, coupled with the quest for better service delivery and sustainability, we anticipate a higher percentage of non-programming costs in subsequent projects. We would, however, ensure the margins are always reasonable by finding ways to reduce, to its barest minimum, non-programming costs so that more funds can, at all times, go into direct projects.
